
what we do



after school programming

In the Fall of 2019, our staff offered two after-school programs at our partner schools:

Budding Entrepreneurs at Central Elementary, led by SYR Americorps VISTA member, Taylor Walters. Budding Entrepreneurs students learn the ins and outs of running a business through the lens of running their own farm stand. Students learn and practice cash-handling, marketing and promotions, product knowledge, and more.

Garden Leaders at Verner Elementary, led by SYR Garden Educator, Natalie Wulf. Garden Leaders get the opportunity to take on a leadership role in their school garden by helping with planting, weeding, composting, and more. Students get the chance to engage in special garden activities like tastings and beautification projects.

- 6. Serve and enjoy!




